Handiwork: Created to Serve by Don DeMouth

I was asked to write an article nearly a month ago about the Appalachia Service Project (ASP) trip that we recently returned from. At the time I was asked I didn't give much thought to what I'd write about since it was a month away. However, since the Flame editor recently sent a reminder that articles are due, finding a subject became more pressing. After receiving that reminder I found myself completing a form for ASP that asked, "What is your favorite aspect of ASP?" I answered truthfully that I don't know. There are several aspects about taking part in this trip that I like and because it's a once a year trip I seem to rediscover them each year. Here is what comes to mind after our recent trip, let's call it my favorites - plural.

Each year we get to know or get to know a little better a bunch of high school aged kids. The adults on the trip are usually impressed with the youth that take part. This may be because of how brave they are to take part at all or how good they get at the home repair projects they work on or how kind they can be to each other, to the families whose home they are working on or to the adults on the trip. I enjoy spending a week with those kids that come back each year, to see how much they mature over the course of a few years. There is an advantage (or two) to not being a parent to most or all of the kids; during the rest of the year we don't spend much time with them so we notice the changes in maturity and abilities from year to year. Being able to see those changes is a lot of fun. It is my hope that we are, in some small way, contributing to the creation of good citizens, and eventually good adults.

Another of my favorite aspects of ASP is having the opportunity to spend time with the other adults that go on the trip. Whether it's getting up in the morning prior to the kids and spending a bit of quiet time drinking coffee and talking with them, making plans prior to the trip, or working beside them on our projects it is rewarding being able to spend time with such outstanding adults. I take vacation from work in order to go on the trip and it honestly feels like a vacation because I get to spend time with friends, people that I really enjoy being with.

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The young adults that go with us have been with us for between 5 and 7 trips. We have seen most of them start as freshmen in high school. At this point they're capable of running their own crews. They are responsible for the kids, for preparation at the center, for the work projects and still remain respectful of us older adults. Where they used to wait to be asked to do something or ask if they should do this or that, now they simply take it upon themselves to make things happen. They make the trip much easier and, I feel, are walking examples of what I mentioned earlier, good citizens and good adults.

The family situation that each work crew enters is a mystery until Monday morning when we all meet the homeowners. There may be a lone person in the house, a couple, a single parent with one or more children, a young family with kids, or a multigenerational family. In some cases the families are dealing with mental or physical or health issues. They all share some sort of economic difficulty. Some years there is a great deal of interaction with the families, other times hardly any. The kids on the trip always seem to adapt to whatever the situation is. This year the family, whose home my crew worked on, was another favorite aspect, they were a multigenerational family with adult kids dropping off grandkids so they could go to work and other family coming and going all day. I never really figured out which grandkids belonged to which kids or who actually lived in the house and who was just visiting. It was sort of chaos but it worked for them and it was fun for us. I know that Miss Patricia and Mr. Tony, the matriarch and patriarch of the family, had a bunch of people in the house and those people seemed to be happy we were there and they were happy to sit down and share lunch with us. From my perspective it was a good year with the family we served.

Helping people is the reason we take part in ASP and another of my favorite aspects about it. The stated goal is to make the homes we work on warmer, safer and drier. There are times that in addition to making a home warmer, safer or drier there may be secondary benefit to our working on a home such as making the home owners feel more pride in their home or motivating someone who has given up on finding work to go out and look for a job. Those who attended the "ASP Service" the Sunday after our return heard Kevin O'Shea speak of how a neighbor of an ASP homeowner told him about a transformation in his neighbor, how the work ASP had done on her house seemed to lift her spirits and improve her outlook. There's no guarantee that this will happen, in fact there's an excellent chance that ASP volunteers will never know how their weeks work may affect the home owners since we aren't there for a long period and we don't often see the end of our projects. We are usually content knowing that the work we did helped someone in some manner. An aspect of helping people that isn't always talked about is how ASP helps those that volunteer. Some volunteers become more confident in their abilities, in how they get along with peers, in how they deal with others in general, in some cases just in the fact that they manage to get through the week can be a huge boost.

The last favorite aspect I'd like to mention is how those of us on the trip become closer to God. Talking about it or in this case writing about it is <u>not</u> one of my favorite things, I don't have an easy time discussing "God stuff" and have more questions and doubts than answers but while on the trip it becomes a bit easier to talk about God and also easier to talk to God. I like that. I'm pretty sure the reason for that increased ease has to do with the setting, the work we do, and the people I'm with.

The theme for ASP this year is, "Handiwork: Created to Serve", it is based on Ephesians 2:10 -

For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life.

More than most years I was able to relate to this particular theme, I do feel that part of the reason we are here is to help one another. Thank you God.

Trustee's Report

A Trustee Meeting was not held in July but here are some updates on the existing projects:

1. Most <u>repairs to the sign</u> have been completed and waiting on installing a new hinge and cover (by week ending 7/23) for the reader board. Also included in the repair process are new much larger and more visible letters. Once the last few repair items are completed the lighting will be installed.

2. <u>Column repair</u> is 95% complete and all plastic has been removed from outside the building and all scaffolding has been taken down. Remaining are small finishing details and Barrett Roofing will need to complete the flat roof flashing inspection around the new column and then validate our warranty. Final completion by Cenaxo will be by July M/E. This project will bring closure to a long much needed repair

On behalf of the Trustees I thank everyone for their patience and support during this reconstruction.



As usual, I will gladly take monetary donations and do the shopping for you!


We need to have the donations ready to be delivered in time for our social worker to distribute them before school begins. That means I will need them **before the third Sunday in August**, if possible.
