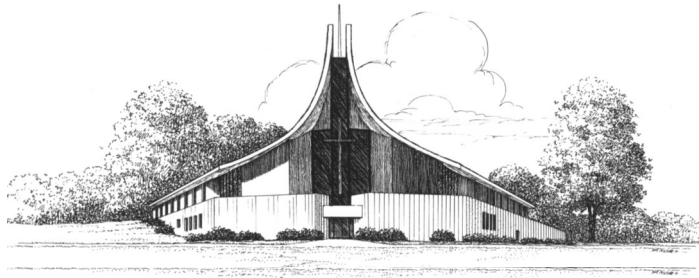

## Message from Pastor Kim

“When Interruptions Become Blessings”

This past Sunday, the theme of my sermon was on what can happen when we allow the interruptions of life to become unexpected blessings. I'd like to continue that theme in this article. As most of you know, I recently returned to work after a period of recovery from a total knee replacement (left knee). Certainly, in anticipating the surgery, I had viewed it as a huge interruption: the loss of weeks of time in the church; weeks of personal time; the possibility of a summer vacation. This is of course not to mention having to face the risks of major surgery; painful aftermath and necessary rehabilitation; side effects of pain meds; no driving for a month, etc. I now realize that as with many times when we are caught off guard with life's surprises, I was being short-sighted. First of all, the opportunity to get a new knee (AMAZING technology) with the chance to walk better and be out of pain (and being fortunate enough to have health insurance to cover it) is an incredible gift, for which I will always be grateful.

Rev. James Forbes, one of my preaching professors at Union Theological Seminary, was fond of saying that it was only in hindsight that we could look back and see the hidden hand of God at work through the people and circumstances of our lives. That is certainly true for me as I look back over the past two months and feel so uplifted by God's presence through it all. It is always the case, isn't it, that as we look back over life's twists and turns, there are unexpected gifts of grace if we can receive them. There are always “angels of mercy” if we can spot them.

I am grateful for the many “angels of mercy” who blessed my life these past few months. There was my surgeon, Dr. Bostrom at Hospital for Special Surgery, who took the time to say words of calm and encouragement to me in my anxious moments before the surgery, not to mention having performed the surgery flawlessly. There were many caring nurses, but there were three that went the extra mile in caring for me during a few especially challenging moments during my hospitalization. There was the female Jewish orthodox chaplain who made a pastoral call to me at the hospital, and whose prayer and presence provided spiritual comfort. During my 6 day stay at Helen Hayes Rehabilitation Hospital, there was a wonderful physician, a handful of nurses, and two physical therapists whose care in helping me take my literal “next steps” was exemplary.

Then there were all of you, my church family at Danbury UMC. There were so many angels of mercy among you--persons who brought meals; persons who drove me to dr.'s appointments and physical therapy; persons who came to visit and sent cards; and most important of all each of you who offered prayers during my surgery, hospitalization, and recovery. I am also grateful for Rev. Jim Stinson, who graciously agreed to preach for five Sundays, and whose thoughtful messages kept us all inspired.

There came a moment, just before my surgery, when I was feeling anxious and knew it was time to turn it all over to God. And when I was able to do that, I understood that with God everything would be all right--not just my knee surgery, but EVERYTHING. All else falls away when you know that. Everything becomes clear. And that is how the interruption of my knee surgery blessed me with some precious gifts: first and foremost being reminded that in moments of fear God will always be with us and next to that knowledge nothing else matters; and second, that God has some pretty powerful angels of mercy to help us through the difficult times, to point us in the right direction. For all of the many blessings that came my way these past two months, I give thanks to God and to the people of God, which includes all of you.

Appalachia Service Project (ASP) 2015 consisted of 9 work crews that travelled to and worked in Wyoming County, West Virginia. In all, 14 adults, 8 young adults (college age) and 33 high-school aged youth took part in the mission trip this year to make homes warmer, safer and drier, the goal of ASP.

Also, there are several adults who did not go on the trip but have provided invaluable service to the project, for a number of years now, by dealing with finances, fund raising and a myriad of forms.

ASP began for most of the participants in March with an initial Rally and culminated in the trip to Appalachia the week of Saturday June 27<sup>th</sup> through Sunday July 5<sup>th</sup>. In between there were fund raising car washes, orientations and skills training.

The first leg of the trip on Saturday was to Staunton, Virginia where we spent the night at St. John's United Methodist Church. Our friends from St. John's have hosted us for six years now. The next morning we had an informal and early service before proceeding to Bud, WV where we spend the week at Herndon Elementary school.

The work that our crews did included roofing, installing underpinning beneath homes, insulating several homes, building a wheelchair ramp, painting, installing drywall and providing drainage. Each week during an ASP Summer a new set of volunteers comes in to work on homes in need of repair in the area. Our week was the second week with volunteers in Bud so most of the homes we worked on had some work underway by volunteers from the previous week. Other volunteers would work on most of the same homes during ensuing weeks.



This was the 6<sup>th</sup> year that we have sent volunteers to Appalachia from Danbury; each year has been different but a couple of things that don't seem to change are that the people who return from Appalachia are changed from the ones who left a week earlier and most everyone comes home with more friends than they left with.

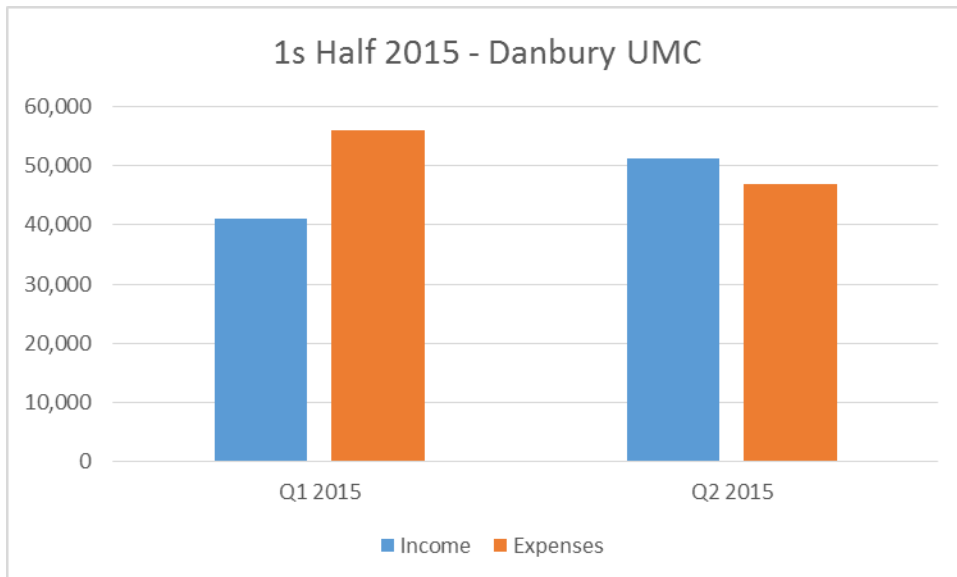

## Q2 2015 Financial Update

Danbury UMC closed out Q2 2015 with income of \$51.3K and expenses of \$46.9K for the operating budget, excluding designated funds like the roof fund. This represents a Q2 profit of \$4.4K. On a full year basis, ending June 30<sup>th</sup> 2015, the church is at a net loss of \$10.6K. With expenses expected to remain lower in Q3 and Q4 combined with additional fund raising like the Pumpkin Festival in the 2<sup>nd</sup> half, the church is on a trend to break-even on a full year basis barring any significant changes. Thanks to everyone for staying current with pledging! This was and remains critical to ensure we can cover weekly expenses as we work back to break-even.



The budget story is not the only important financial story of Q2. In addition to improving our budget position, the church also raised over \$21K for the roof fund! This is a tremendous accomplishment that demonstrates a profound commitment to our church.

I will be posting detailed Q2 reports outside of the office on the board by the end of the month and am available for any questions or suggestions.
